FILZWOLLE UNI

Wrapped Eggshells

Filzwolle uni from Gründl
100 % Virgin Wool
50 g / 50 m

Usage:

approx. 145 cm Filzwolle uni (also an additional small amount of yarn that can be cut into pieces) double sided tape, crochet thread (if you would like to hang the wrapped eggs), scissors, craft glue

Pattern:

Glued spiral wrapping using Filzwolle

Instructions:

Preparation: Carefully using a sharp knife, poke holes into the top and bottom of a raw egg to create approx. 3-4mm sized holes. Blow the egg out of the shell. Wash and allow to completely dry.

Using a small pair of scissors, carefully cut the top third of the eggshell off.

You can also use the shell from a breakfast egg. After eating, wash thoroughly and allow to dry. Carefully cover the eggshell with double sided tape. As you like, you can leave a portion of eggshell showing at the top or cover the whole eggshell.

Remove the outer foil from the double sided tape and starting at the top of the eggshell, wrap the Filzwolle around the egg in circular and spiral movements until you reach the bottom of the egg.

Cut the end of the yarn as close to the eggshell as possible at the bottom centre and secure with a few drops of craft glue. It is helpful to allow the glue to dry a tad and then firmly press onto the egg. The glue will be transparent once dry.

Filling: You can fill the finished eggshells as you desire. You can plant small flowers or herbs, such as cress, primrose or daffodils - there are no limits to your creativity.

Decoration:

It is up to you how you would like to showcase your wrapped eggshells. You can either place them in an egg carton or decorate on a plate or hang them up. Our thin, delicate crochet thread works well for hanging. Attach to the eggshells in the desired length.
